Interview guide

Context:

The interview guide keeps us focused on our research questions during the interview. It's crucial to write questions that aren't biased.

How to translate your research plan into an interview guide:

- 1. Review your research plan thoroughly
- 2. Extract your main research questions
- 3. Rephrase those questions in conversational language without any company jargon

Do's and don'ts for your interview guide:

Do ask lots of "why" and open-ended questions
Do give users space to really express themselves

Do leave plenty of time for follow up questions

Do bring the interview guide with you, and highlight your most important questions

Don't ask "yes/no" questions

Don't use the interview guide as a strict script - use it as a general blueprint instead

After you write your interview guide, use this checklist to make sure it's strong:

Don't validate, evaluate:

- Focus on understanding users' needs and struggles.
- Don't try to prove your hypothesis.

Be intentional:

Each question should have a clear purpose.

Finish the conversation
